2. Trails

Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme

- Projects funded under the above-mentioned scheme in 2019, 2020 and 2021 currently in progress.
- Applications currently being drafted for ORIS 2022 under Measure 1 and the Project Development Measure. To be submitted before 19th April 2022.

Waterford Greenway

• A number of projects are currently being planned and/or implemented on Waterford Greenway with both WCCC funding sources and funding support from TII.

Greenway Feasibility Studies

- Continuing to work with Cork Co Co and Atkins Ireland with regard to the Dungarvan to Mallow Greenway feasibility study. Public consultation period no. 1 due to close on 29th April 2022. https://www.corkrdo.ie/greenways/mallow-to-dungarvan-greenway/
- Working with Tipperary County Council with regard to feasibility study into a Waterford Greenway to Suir Blueway Connection. TOBIN consulting engineers have been appointed as consultant in order to progress this study during 2022.

Waterford Trails

• Continuing to engage with Sport Ireland Outdoors and local trail development groups around Waterford with regard to ongoing monitoring, maintenance, development and promotion of Waterford's existing recreational trail network.

Note: Passersby are probing wireless devices detected by a Meraki Access Point (AP). While a passerby was seen by the network, its probes and dwell time did not meet the requirements to be considered a visitor. More detailed information on Visitors is provided below.


Visitors to Dungarvan town centre

- The charts and points below relate to those classified as Visitors and not Passersby.
- In March 2022 the average daily visits were 985 which is down slightly on February from 1,008.
- The repeat visit rate for March 89% which is down 1% on the previous month.
- The median visit length was 26 minutes; the same length as February 2022.
- The largest grouping of visitors in March 2022 were classified as 'Weekly visitors' representing half of all visitors. 28% were classified as 'Daily visitors' which is a slight decrease from the February figure of 30.5%. 10% are classified as 'Occasional Visitors' and 10% as 'First time visitors'.

Notes:

- Occasional visitors have visited at least once before. This visitor may have visited several times but does not meet weekly requirements.
- Weekly visitors have visited in at least two distinct weeks out of the past four, but not frequently enough to be considered daily visitors.
- Daily visitors have visited in at least five distinct days in the past eight.
- First time have never been seen before today.

Dungarvan Town Centre Footfall: March 2021 compared to March 2022



Note: Chart compares days of the week rather than dates for ease of comparison. In March 2021 Ireland was in Level 5 restrictions with childcare and education resuming.
