Waterford Local Enterprise Pitch Perfect Start Up Competition

Local Enterprise Office (LEO) Waterford, ArcLabs Research and Innovation Centre and Boxworks joined forces to deliver Pitch Perfect on 21st and 22nd April. The competition was aimed at discovering innovative startups that could help transform the business landscape in Waterford. Seven successful applicants participated at a 2 day Business Bootcamp where they were guided through the initial stages of developing their idea and learning how to pitch it. Participants then pitched their business ideas to the judges who selected the winner. The judges were highly impressed by the quality of the pitches and selected Praveen Kaur of Uoto as the winner on the day. Uoto is centred around the sharing economy and will target incoming passengers to an airport and offer them the ability to rent cars that are owned by individuals who are flying out of the same airport. Praveen will receive a cash prize of €1,000 and along with all the other participants will receive mentoring from the LEO.











75 Planning applications were received countywide in from 1st-28th April 2023. This compares with 96 planning applications received for the same period in 2022.

A total of 295 planning applications were received in the year to 28th April 2023. This compares to 354 planning applications which were received in the same period in 2022.





Heritage Officer Report

Decade of Commemorations

A seminar on the Centenary of Waterford Farm Labourer's Strike 1923 will take place in the Park Hotel, Dungarvan on May 4th and includes talks by Dr. Emmet O'Connor, Dr. Pat McCarthy, Dr. Terry Dunne and Kieran Allen(UCD). The Waterford Commemorations Website Waterford1916to1923.ie will be launched at the event. Registration is available on Eventbrite.ie

Five applications were received under the Community Commemoration Grant Scheme for projects commemorating the 1921-1923 period and are currently being assessed by the Waterford Commemorations Committee.

Heritage Funding 2023

Four projects have been awarded funding under the Community Monuments Fund allocated by the National Monuments Service of the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage to a value of €270,000 for conservation and survey of a range of archaeological sites across the city and county.

Funding to a value of €100,000 has been awarded under the Local Biodiversity Action Fund allocated by the National Parks and Wildlife Service of the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage for projects on Brent Geese, Barn Owls, control of invasive species, wetland management and control of invasive species.

The Heritage Council have awarded €35,000 under the Heritage Plan Fund.


Forward Planning Report

Residential Zoned Land Tax (RZLT) Draft Map of land in-scope

A draft map indicating land considered in-scope for the purposes of the RZLT was prepared by Waterford City and County Council, was placed on display over the period November-December 2022 and written submissions were invited. There are two issues of note resulting from this process:

- 1. A total of 67 written submissions were received. The planning authority provided a written determination to each submission received, the result of which was to retain lands in-scope which were the subject of 57 submissions while the land referred to in the remaining 10 submissions was considered out of scope for the purposed of the tax. Persons aggrieved by such determinations have opportunity to make an appeal to An Bord Pleanála and at time of writing a total of 5 such appeals have been made but this will likely increase. It is intended that all appeals will be determined by An Bord Pleanála within 16 weeks of 1st of May.
- 2. It should be noted that Waterford City and County Council has not prepared a supplemental map identifying additional lands for the purposes of the tax and a statement to this effect along with social media and newspaper notices have now issued.

As per the timeline below, the final map of lands identified as in-scope for the RZLT will be published by the planning authority on 1st of December. The final map will have regard to the determinations of the planning authority on written submissions received and those of An Bord Pleanála on all appeals.

RURAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME:

- •The programme is fully allocated.
- •Payments are progressing well on remaining projects.
- •The drafting of the LDS (Local Development Strategy) is progressing. Clsoing date for submission to the Department of Rural and Community Development is 14th July.

COMHAIRLE NA NÓG:

The topic for 2023 has been identified as Relationships and Sexual Education in schools. Progress on 2023 activities is being made weekly by the young people. Funding application for 2023 and 2022 Annual Report have been completed and submitted to Pobal. Valuable submissions were made by the young people during the LECP data gathering stage.

WATERFORD AGE FRIENDLY PROGRAMME:

The new strategy is now finalised having been presented to the Alliance on March 19th. A launch of the strategy is planned for May 2023 with initial action plan now available.

ST PATRICK'S FESTIVAL 2023

The St Patrick's Day Parade took place on Friday 17th March 2023 and was attended by approximately 15,000 spectators. There were 2000 participants in the parade and 80 community groups took part. The parade ran smoothly and was well received by the public despite dreary weather conditions. A Thomas Francis Meagher flag presentation and an exhibition of Irish dancing preceded the parade on The Mall. All festival events were well attended including the outdoor spoken word stage, Booley House traditional variety act in Garter Lane, City Fairground, music workshops, Wobbly Circus and Active Cities entertainments. Greening took place on the traditional parade route along The Quay, City Marina, Reginald's Tower, Bishop's Palace, Theatre Royal, 35 The Mall, City Hall and Waterford Crystal. A 'Museum Free Day' in the Medieval Museum saw record numbers pass thorough the doors on the 18th March, the attraction was at full capacity for the entire day. 220 musicians and performers were on show on stages in the Applemarket, Garter Lane and the Cultural Quarter. 45 Harpists performed at a very unique concert in St. Patrick's Gateway Centre. Live streams of festival highlights were broadcast on social media.

Fáilte Ireland arranged for a contingent of international Tour Buyers (Meitheal) to a visit Waterford on St Patrick's day. The group were treated to a visit of Mount Congreve Gardens, a tour of the Medieval Museum, a cycle on the Greenway and Grandstand Parade viewing seats followed by Irish Coffees in The Reg. The tour buyers were from France, Italy, Spain, Germany, Great Britain and The Netherlands, all were highly impressed with their experience in Waterford

HEALTHY WATERFORD - ONGOING PROJECTS

The confirmation of the funding contract is expected by mid May. The delay in the funding has affected the roll out of some of the projects that were to run in Q2 of 2023. Throughout this period we have remained in contact with our key parnters and delivered non – funded related services to local communities.

The next meeting of the Well Waterford committee takes place on the 23rd of May.

SLÁINTECARE HEALTHY COMMUNITIES PROGRAMME (SHCP):

A lot of progress has been made under the Sláintecare Healthy Communities Programme with Waterford City & County Council and the HSE working together on promoting and implementing the programme locally. Various projects are progressing in conjunction with Waterford Sports Partnership, SETU and Healthy Waterford. Seed funding of €75,000 from the Department of Health has been allocated to these projects.

WATERFORD COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP (WCSP):

The Community Safety Innovation Fund, increased to €3 million for 2023 will close for applications on Friday 19th May 2023. Established in April 2021, the Fund uses money seized by An Garda Síochána and the Criminal Assets Bureau from the proceeds of crime to fund innovative new projects to support community safety. Last year a total of €2 million was granted across 22 projects, of which Waterford was successful in two. Grants will range from €20,000 to €150,000 and for more information visit: https://www.gov.ie/en/publication/a5d23-2022-community-safety-innovation-fund-funding-call/

The CoOrdinator presented to the Older People's Council on the Community Safety Plan, attended the new City Centre Retail Forum Meetings, met with other organisations requesting meetings on community safety matters such as approved housing bodies and potential applicants for the Community Safety Innovation Fund.

The Chair and the Coordinator attended the launch/discussion of the LCSP Pilot Interim Evaluation Report Launch/Discussion in Dublin. A copy of the report was circulated to all Councillors and members of the Partnership.

The next plenary Meeting of the WLCSP is on Monday 8th May 2023 in the Civic offices, Dungarvan at 6pm. The call for applications for the Fund runs from 27 March until Friday 19 May 2023 and grants will range from €20,000 to €150,000.

UKRAINIAN COMMUNITY RESPONSE FORUM:

The Ukrainian CRF is in place to assist with housing, supporting and integrating Ukrainian refugees into our communities. All key agencies are working in collaboration to provide services and supports to all Ukrainians arriving into Waterford. Approximately 2,400 Ukrainian refugees have been registered in Waterford to date with over 1,578 Ukrainians having been received directly into Waterford Council run Rest Centres in Dungarvan and Waterford City. To date 1,129 Ukrainians have been matched with pledged and other accommodation sourced by Waterford Council. Waterford Area Partnership are supporting those who have moved with integration into our communities.

A new local add for 'offer a home' pledge call for vacant properties went live on 17th April on WLRFM running for 21 days. We will be posting the ad on our social media pages also for May. Any queries on same should be directed to offerahome@waterfordcouncil.ie or 058 22059.

PRIDE OF PLACE:

The National Coordinators meeting took place on March 9th to formally begin the 2023 process with the categories for the competition clarified. Preparation for the 2023 competition has begun with entrants currently being identified.

SICAP

Work in ongoing with Waterford Area Partnership continuing to implement the SICAP programme on behalf of the LCDC.

SICAP Budget allocations for 2023 have now been confirmed and the budget for Waterford City & County (24-1) is €1,319,399 excluding the Ukrainian budget allocation which has been set as €232,758 by the Department.

TIG

The Community Department continue to support the Waterford Traveller Interagency Group which continues to meet regularly.

LOCAL ECONOMIC & COMMUNITY PLAN (LECP)

Progress on the preparation of the new LECP is ongoing. The Socio-Economic Statement has been prepared in line with Department issued guidelines. The data collection phase has now been completed with all key stakeholders, agencies, reporesentative groups and the broader public having been consulted with. Work is ongoing now to merge the data gathered into a coherent draft linked to the high level goals identified. The LECP is on schedule for adoption at the July Plenary Council meeting.

THE SUPPORTING WATERFORD COMMUNITY FUND 2023

The 2023 Supporting Waterford Community Fund recipients were formally approved at the April Plenary meeting. A total of €193,457 was divided among 294 successful applicants.

COMMUNITY RECOGNITION FUND 2023

Following the public online expression of interest survey, projects were assessed and Waterford Council's submitted an application to the Department on the 15th March. In total 13 projects were submitted to the Department and we are awaiting the Department's approval of same.

CLÁR MEASURE 1 - DEVELOPING COMMUNITY FACILITIES & AMENITIES

Applications are now open for Measure 1 of the CLÁR scheme with funding for the enhancement of existing, and/or the development of new, accessible Community Recreation Facilities. Up to 15 applications in total can be submitted from the relevant Local Authorities in respect of Measure 1. Priority for 2023 will be given in respect of small scale renovation works to community buildings (e.g. floors, windows, doors, heating upgrades, kitchen upgrades) and in particular community centres that did not receive funding under the Community Centres Investment Fund. The maximum level of funding for any individual project is €50,000 and grant-funding is at a rate of 90% of total project costs. Closing date for applications is Thursday 11th May 2023 at 4 p.m. sharp.

Seirbhísi Éigeandala / Emergency Services

FIRE SERVICE OPERATIONAL ACTIVITY:

Total call outs to incidents attended by the 10 fire stations of the Fire Authority are shown for the year to date and for the month of March. ANTI-DUMPING INITIATIVE 2023

11 projects in the functional area of Waterford City & County Council have been approved for funding under the Department of Communications, Climate Action and Environment sponsored Anti-Dumping Initiative 2023.

CLIMATE ACTION

Climate Action Plan

A pre-draft consultation for the Climate Action Plan will be live in May and we will share it with elected members when it is available

Climate Community Action Fund

The Climate Action Team are working with the libraries to deliver climate change awareness programmes. We are working with the knitting groups to create a piece of art showing climate change over the last 100 years and we are working with the literacy programmes in the Education Training Board.

ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION & AWARENESS

Green Flag Programme

School visits and assessments were completed for both green flag renewals and first time applications. A renewal visit must take place before a school submits a renewal application form for their renewal Green Flags (Energy, Water, Travel, Biodiversity and the Global Citizenship themes). Renewal visits are carried out by the Environment Awareness Officer. 24 schools will be awarded their flags at a Green Schools ceremony on 10th May.

Community Clean-Ups

Waterford City & County Council facilitates community clean ups throughout the year to clean up litter and illegally dumped waste from approach roads, local beauty spots, beaches and general public areas. These have begun again in earnest. We continue to supply bags, gloves and litter pickers to many of the groups taking part, distributing them from both our Dungarvan and Waterford offices. Collection of any bags of litter is then arranged following the clean-up. National Spring Clean takes place throughout the month of April; registrations are now being taken at www.national-springclean.org; as part of this we supply bags, gloves and litter pickers to many of the groups taking part, as well as collecting the bags of litter for all clean ups. Groups are encouraged to register their clean up as a National Spring Clean event to receive additional resources from An Taisce.

Tidy Towns

We have been working with Tidy Towns groups to further their work towards the 2023 competition. The closing date for entries this year is 10th May. Tidy Towns groups around the county will be working towards keeping their area looking well for adjudicators over the coming months. The national SuperValu Tidy Towns competition is an annual contest organised by the Department of Rural and Community Development. The competition involves participating areas being rated on all aspects of their local environment and prizes are awarded to the best under many different categories, from Litter to Sustainability. The overall winner is "Ireland's Tidiest Town" which is announced at a national ceremony in September each year.

Grants

A local Anti-Litter and Anti-Graffiti Grant and a local Circular Economy Grant have been advertised on the website, social media and in local newspapers. Application forms and further information on both grants is available through the website.

Local Anti-Litter and Anti-Graffiti Grant:

this is for community groups, youth groups, schools or other community development organisations, based in County Waterford, who are interested in receiving funding for public education and awareness initiatives regarding litter or graffiti.

Local Circular Economy Grant:

a circular economy is based on long-life products that can be renewed, reused, repaired, upgraded and refurbished to preserve natural resources, protect habitats and reduce pollution. It is about finding ways to keep items in use longer and not generating as much waste in the first place. It is about rethinking the way we do things – redesigning the items we use – changing attitudes and changing behaviours about what we buy and what we throw away. The main focus for applications this year should be on projects to promote a circular economy e.g. repairing, reusing, building skills and knowledge in the community to facilitate repair and reuse, changing attitudes and behaviours to how we use items, reduce use of single use items (encourage use of reusable items).

Ealaíona & Cultúr / Arts & Culture

Arts

Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts Gaeltacht, Sport & Media will be having a Zoom meeting with the Arts and Culture Department to discuss the current shortage of spaces for the production of Art projects and groups such as Music Generation, Rogue Gallery etc.

Poetry Day was on April 27th but was sadly foreshadowed by the deaths of Actor Jenny Ledwell and young creative artist Erika Tammen. Both were due to be involved events during the day. While a number of events got cancelled the vast majority went ahead with most events centred around Waterford and Dungarvan.

The 27th also marked the first official showing of The Hurler film by Tony Kelly in Garter Lane.

The new exhibition for the Waterford Gallery of Art has had a soft opening. It is based on interpretations of Lanscapes and will have a strong outreach programme attached. Directors and Donors of the Museum of Contemporary Art (MOCA) Jacksonville are coming to view the show continuing a relationship brokered between the two collections when the Arts Office was based in Greyfriars.

Music Generation and the Theatre Royal produced an evening of rock and pop with the next generation of musicians. Mayor, Cllr. John O'Leary and the head of Music Generation Ireland Rosalyn Molloy was in attendance. Waterford will feature strongly in the summer edition of the Irish Arts Review.

The Townhall Theatre in Dungarvan has been populated with artwork from the Waterford Collection.

The Old Market House Dungarvan features a Landscapes Exhibition by Uri Blayer and also our Pauline Bewick Exhibition from the Waterford Art Collection.

In SETU all the artwork supplied by Waterford Council, with the exception of a piece by Ger Sweeney in the Boardroom, has been collected. We will consider giving them prints in the future as some of the artwork was in poor condition upon inspection.

The Bryan Flynn Painting is to be reframed with Museum/UV resistant glass and returned to the Theatre Royal. Work continues on a storage unit to replace the current Art Storage Room in City Hall as the Council building is to be reroofed.

Storage solutions are also being examined for other art and culture temporary infrastructure.

The Invitation to Collaboration partnership (Kilkenny, Wexford, Waterford, Carlow, Arts Council, Creative Waterford) is now moving into a 2nd phase after launching the report two months ago. GOMA has had a major facelift with proper Gallery Windows installed on the street side. It has also had its leaking roof repaired.

Plans are nearing completion for SITC. This years festival may have to be curtailed due to the exorbitant cost of insurance. The Arts Office is going to tender for a portable trailer stage. It will be full speced out for theatre and music performances. The Arts Office is also going to tender for a number of Dome Tents that can be used for performance and events.

The Waterford ArtLinks Bursaries 2023 have been awarded to Waterford artists across a variety of artforms to support their professional development. The full list of recipients can be seen on waterfordarts.com

Entries are currently open for the Arts Office national Molly Keane Creative Writing Award 2023 to stimulate new writing in Irish short stories.

The Arts Office is assisting a project with the writer Lani O' Hanlon to co-create a book of poems, some written in collaboration with those coming towards the end of life or with bereaved people. This project is in association with the Arts Council, Réalta (formerly Waterford Healing Arts) and the Irish Hospice Foundation.

EVENT HIGHLIGHTS FROM APRIL:


- •Spring into Storytime is a national family literacy programme to mark this there were 33 Story Time events in Library branches in Waterford with approximately 1,000 attendees in April.

- •Metropolitan Mayor of Waterford Cllr Jason Murphy opened the Right of Place Second Chance art exhibition, Creative Art for Survivors, on Thursday 13th April. Right of Place Second Chance is Ireland's largest organisation supporting survivors of institutional abuse in Ireland and their families.

LIBRARY DEVELOPMENT:

- •New RFID kiosks have been installed. These kiosks are more user friendly.
- •Waterford Libraries ongoing support of Ukrainian refugees provided 29 English classes or groups to 232 attendees in the month of April.
- •The Library Writers events team successfully got €4,200 in funding from Creative Waterford to provide high quality creative writing workshops for Waterford people in 2023. These are being organised in association with the Irish Writer's centre and details will be available shortly.

UPCOMING EVENTS:

- •Our Bealtaine programme will take place across County Waterford in May. Our Bealtaine Choir is this year's National flagship choir, selected from choirs from all around Ireland, which will make our dawn chorus even more special this year.
- •The Towers and Tales Festival will take place in Lismore on the May Bank Holiday weekend. Towers and Tales is a celebration of contemporary children's literature and illustration.
- •Bestselling Authors Liz Nugent and Aingeala Flannery will be appearing in Libraries on May 4th and May 10th, respectively.
- •The Library Life podcast is on its third episode. In the latest instalment Angela and Tracy reviewed 'Waterford Women of the Revolution 1914-1923,' by Christina Knight-O'Connor and Eddie Cantwell and discussed Local Studies resources available online with Waterford Libraries.
