PLANNING APPLICATIONS RECEIVED – COUNTYWIDE

82 Planning applications were received countywide in from 1st-29th May 2023. This compares with 100 planning applications received for the same period in 2022.

A total of 387 planning applications were received in the year to 29th May 2023. This compares to 461 planning applications which were received in the same period in 2022.



Heritage Officer Report

Decade of Commemorations

Five projects have been awarded funding under the Community Commemoration Grant Scheme for projects commemorating the 1921-1923.

Heritage Council Community Heritage Grant Scheme

Seven projects were successful in their application to the Heritage Council's Community Heritage Grant Scheme.

Biodiversity

Waterford City and County Council with funding from the Heritage Council are supporting a goat grazing project at Ardmore Head to help restore the protected habitats within the Special Area of Conservation. Due to lack of management and grazing on Ardmore Head SAC over the past two decades the protected Dry Heath habitat of Bell Heather and Western Gorse has been invaded by Bracken and Common Gorse. Goat grazing and trampling of the area will reduce the cover of these invasive species and allow regeneration of the coastal heath along the headland. There is also the remnants of an Éire sign on the site from the Emergency which will be exposed with the help of the goats. The goats were acquired from William Walsh, a West Cork shepherd-horticulturist from Enniskeane, whose Billy's Rent-A-Goat business forms part of his wide-ranging promotion of ethical land management and social education.

Birdwatch Ireland have been commissioned by Waterford City and County Council to carry out a survey of Barn Owls in the county. Anecdotal evidence indicates Barn Owls are increasing in Waterford possibly influenced by availability of prey such as the GreaterWhite-toothed Shrew. A detailed survey of suitable habitat for Barn Owl along with monitoring of nesting sites and awareness raising measures will benefit the conservation of the red listed species in Co. Waterford. Sightings of Barn Owl can be reported to the Heritage Officer at bguest@waterfordcouncil.ie to help inform the county wide survey.

Visit by the Norwegian Ambassador

Mayor of Waterford Metropolitan District Council Cllr. Jason Murphy welcomed Ambassador Mari Skåre of the Royal Norwegian Embassy to City Hall on May 22nd to celebrate and promote our shared Viking heritage. The Ambassador visited Reginald's Tower, Woodstown Viking site and Waterford County Museum and met Deputy Matt Shanahan, Deputy David Cullinane and members of Woodstown Viking Site Steering Committee.

Heritage Week

Heritage Week this year runs from August 12th-20th. This year's theme invites people to explore the traditions and practices, knowledge and skills passed down through generations. National Heritage Week celebrates Ireland's cultural, built and natural heritage and events can be registered on the heritageweek.ie portal. A printed Heritage Week events guide will also be published by Waterford City and County Council.

Heritage Funding 2023

Over 10 applications have been submitted for projects across Waterford to the Heritage Council's Community Heritage Fund. The aim of this scheme is to support capital projects that improve access and inclusion to heritage sites; that apply good heritage practice to the management of places, collections, or objects including buildings. Eight applications have been submitted to the Community Monuments Fund allocated by the National Monuments Service of the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage to a value of €336,000 for conservation and survey of a range of archaeological sites across the city and county.

Six applications have been submitted to the Local Biodiversity Action Fund allocated by the National Parks and Wildlife Service of the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage to a value of €100,000 for projects on Brent Geese, Barn Owls, control of invasive species, wetland management and control of invasive species. The outcome of funding applications will be known by early May.

Conservation Officer Report

Works have commenced on some of the 28 projects granted funding under the Built Heritage Investment Scheme and Historic Structures Fund. Waterford City and County Council also received €100,000 in funding under the Community Monument Fund for conservation works to Blackfriars Abbey in the City.

Archaeological testing at Parade Quay has also revealed sections of the City wall under the ground level of the existing buildings on the Quay.

Cathedral Square. In June the public will be able to see the conservation works within the new museum including timbers dating from 15th century, medieval stone lined drain and 17th century fireplace and oven. A stone floor was also discovered which included broken pieces of marble and cut stone from the Cathedral, which were probably removed in the late 18th century when the new Cathedral was being constructed.



Historic wallpaper experts from US and Europe came to visit Mount Congreve to look at the Chinese wallpaper. This wallpaper was manufactured in the Canton region in 1780s. It is a rare example of such workmanship and another surviving example of this type of wallpaper is at Schloss Schönbrunn in Vienna. The paper at Mount Congreve is considered is a cultural artefact of international importance.

RURAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME:

- •Draft LDS for RDP 2023-2027 was submitted to Pobal on 28.04.2023.
- •Review points have now been received and LDS will be finalised in June/July.
- •The current programme is 100% allocated.
- •87% of projects have been paid out, with an additional 2% currently at claim stage.

COMHAIRLE NA NÓG:

The topic for 2023 has been identified as Relationships and Sexual Education in schools. Progress on 2023 activities is being made weekly by the young people. Work underway preparing for the creating on the Podcast on the young peoples chosen topic.

WATERFORD AGE FRIENDLY PROGRAMME:

The new strategy will be launched my Minister Mary Butler TD on June 16th 2023 simutanously at the launch of St. Josephs, Manor Hill, Waterford housing development by Minister Dara O'Brien. Planning is underway to begin delivering on the year 1 action plan.

HEALTHY WATERFORD

Several initiatives as part of the Healthy Waterford local strategy have begun. One of our key initiatives to engage closely with communities at grass roots level has been the Playful Streets program. It is available to venues pending good levels of interest from the local community. Playful Streets are a low cost and easy way to turn streets into play spaces, by limiting access to vehicles for a few hours. At Playful Streets children and neighbours can safely play and socialise outside — just like you did when you were young Playful Streets are meant to be simple, you'll find that using your common sense is what you'll need most. Playful Streets are big or small occasions. They can run for a couple of hours on any day of the week. They can be one-off or regular events.

Training was complete with the Place Standard tool that is used to assess the quality of place of which a community lives in. This needs assessment can assess places that are well established, undergoing change, or still being planned. The Pobal funding is being released to the Local Authority from the 1st of June. Several projects have been committed funding. The successful application has received minor adjustments. Further projects will be identified with a aim to spend the majority of the funding this year.

SLÁINTECARE HEALTHY COMMUNITIES PROGRAMME (SHCP):

A lot of progress has been made under the Sláintecare Healthy Communities Programme with Waterford City & County Council and the HSE working together on promoting and implementing the programme locally. Various projects are progressing in conjunction with Waterford Sports Partnership, SETU, Healthy Waterford and community organisations. The Local Implementation Team for the project was set up and had its first meeting. The 2023 Seed funding of €75,000 from the Department of Health has been allocated to 5 projects and sent for approval to the Department of Health.

WATERFORD COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP (WCSP):

Applications have been submitted by the WLCSP to the Community Safety Innovation Fund for a 'Consent Matters' innovative education campaign on 'consent' and 'bystander intervention' throughout the City and County, in collaboration with SETU and The Purple Flag Steering Committee. The Community Innovation Fund, established in April 2021, uses money seized by An Garda Síochána and the Criminal Assets Bureau from the proceeds of crime to fund innovative new projects to support community safety.

The CoOrdinator attended a second City Centre Retail Forum Meetings and in collaboration with Spraoi, a funding Application to Creative Ireland was successful. The Partnership supported the hugely successful Waterford Garda Youth Awards at City Hall, by sponsoring the refreshments.

The last plenary Meeting of the WLCSP, was on Monday 8th May 2023 in the Civic offices, Dungarvan and the Agenda included an overview of the work of Treo Port Lairge by the CEO and a Garda Presentation on the SARA Communications Model (Scanning, Analysis, Response & Assessment).

The next WLCSP Plenary Meeting is schedules for Tuesday 26th September 2023, when Assistant Garda Commissioner Hilman will present to the Partnership.

UKRAINIAN COMMUNITY RESPONSE FORUM:

The Ukrainian CRF is in place to assist with housing, supporting and integrating Ukrainian refugees into our communities. All key agencies are working in collaboration to provide services and supports to all Ukrainians arriving into Waterford. Approximately 2,400 Ukrainian refugees have been registered in Waterford to date with over 1,649 Ukrainians having been received directly into Waterford Council run Rest Centres in Dungarvan and Waterford City. To date 1,520 Ukrainians have been processed at our Emergency Centres with 1,242 matched with pledged and other accommodation sourced by Waterford Council.

Licence renewal of pledges is in excess of 75% and the team continue to work on increasing numbers of BOTPS residing in Waterford.

Waterford Area Partnership are supporting those who have moved with integration into our communities. A new local add for 'offer a home' pledge call for vacant properties went live on 17th April on WLRFM running for 21 days. This resulted in additional interest in the OAH process. We will be posting the ad on our social media pages also shortly. Any queries on same should be directed to offerahome@waterfordcouncil.ie or 058 22059.

PRIDE OF PLACE:

The entrants for the 2023 awards have been identified as CAPE-ability Lismore (winners of the overall PPN award) and the Larchville Lisduggan Residents Group (nominated by the Housing Dept.)

SICAP

Work in ongoing with Waterford Area Partnership continuing to implement the SICAP programme on behalf of the LCDC. SICAP Budget allocations for 2023 have now been confirmed and the budget for Waterford City & County (24-1) is €1,319,399 excluding the Ukrainian budget allocation which has been set as €232,758 by the Department. Planning for the new SICAP 2024+ programme has now commenced.

TIG

The Community Department continue to support the Waterford Traveller Interagency Group which continues to meet regularly.

LOCAL ECONOMIC & COMMUNITY PLAN (LECP)

Progress on the preparation of the new LECP is ongoing. The Socio-Economic Statement has been prepared in line with Department issued guidelines. The data collection phase has now been completed with all key stakeholders, agencies, reporesentative groups and the broader public having been consulted with. Work is ongoing now to merge the data gathered into a coherent draft linked to the high level goals identified. The LECP is on schedule for adoption at the July Plenary Council meeting.

THE SUPPORTING WATERFORD COMMUNITY FUND 2023

Progress on the preparation of the new LECP is ongoing. The Community element of the plan is being fnalised and coordination with the Economic Development Deptartment is ongoing to ensure goal congruence.

COMMUNITY RECOGNITION FUND 2023

The Department of Rural and Community Development has awarded funding of €1,351,000 across a total of 13 Waterford projects under the Community Recognition Fund (CRF) 2023.

The CRF 2023 aims to support the development of community infrastructure and facilities in recognition of the contribution being made by communities in welcoming and hosting significant numbers of arrivals from Ukraine and other countries. The funding is specifically targeted at projects located in communities, towns and villages that are hosting the Beneficiaries of Temporary Protection and/or International Protection Applicants ('new arrivals') including towns identified for the rapid build homes programme.

The Fund aims to support the development of facilities that will be used in the future by all members of the community. It is separate in its objectives and scope to any other public funding streams which aim to support the development of public service needs arising from the significant number of arrivals from Ukraine.

CLÁR MEASURE 1 - DEVELOPING COMMUNITY FACILITIES & AMENITIES

The closing date for receipt of applications for the Clár 1 Measure was at 4p.m. on the 11th May. A total of 9 applications were received 8 of which meet the criteria for submission. CLIMATE ACTION

Climate Action Plan

The pre-draft consultation on the Climate Action Plan is live and submissions can be made until 5.00pm on 16th June. The Consultation lays out the challenges that are ahead for Waterford, what the Council's responsibility is and what other places have done. Bearing these in mind, we are asking the public what climate actions they think the Council should take and what they would like to be able to do themselves. The Consultation has been shared with the PPN, Schools, the Chambers and it has been publicised on the Council's media platforms. We will continue to promote it across the next 3 weeks and we are hosting information sessions in the libraries. We look forward to hearing from many Waterford people as possible on this important topic.

The actions decided upon and approved by the Councillors in January 2024 will be the actions that Waterford City & County Council will take between now and the end of the decade to reduce emissions in the City and County and to prepare for Climate Change.

A workshop on the Consultation will be delivered to elected members on 1st June next.

ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION & AWARENESS

Waste Prevention

National Food Waste Recycling Week takes place from 5th – 11th June with the intention of promoting food waste recycling as a positive climate action but also reminding people to do it correctly. Recent research shows a 2% increase in plastic found in food waste collections, a trend that needs to be kept in check and reversed. As part of this, ads are running on local radio and a social media campaign is being run to promote food recycling and an event to distribute food waste caddies and information packs free of charge at Dungarvan Civic Amenity Site will take place on 10th June next to promote correct food waste separation. 5 drinking water stations at beaches at Ardmore, Clonea, Dunmore East and Tramore are now in place. These will enable visitors to the beach to refill their water bottles, thus encouraging reuse and refilling. This will also reduce the number of plastic bottles disposed of.

Litter

Ballot bins were recently installed in Waterford City, Tramore and Dungarvan and are an initiative to encourage smokers to properly dispose of their cigarette butts. The ballot bins feature an engaging voting system that is a fun way to get people to vote by placing their cigarette butts in one of two voting slots. The ballot bins feature customisable questions and smokers can vote on the topic. The polls will be regularly updated and will feature Yes / No polls with questions such as 'Were Ross and Rachel on a break?' or 'Pineapple on Pizza?' Other polls will offer a choice of answers such as 'Best Blaa filling? and 'Which came first? The Chicken or the egg'. While the topics may be fun and engaging, cigarette butts pose a real societal and environmental problem. They are the most common form of litter in both Waterford and indeed the world, with an estimated 4.5 trillion cigarette butts thrown away every year.

Community Clean-Ups

Waterford City & County Council facilitates community clean ups throughout the year to clean up litter and illegally dumped waste from approach roads, local beauty spots, beaches and general public areas. These have begun again in earnest. We continue to supply bags, gloves and litter pickers to many of the groups taking part, distributing them from both our Dungarvan and Waterford offices. Collection of any bags of litter is then arranged following the clean-up.

Grants

A local Anti-Litter and Anti-Graffiti Grant and a local Circular Economy Grant were advertised on the Council's website, social media and in local newspapers. Applications have been assessed and funding offers made.

Local Anti-Litter and Anti-Graffiti Grant:

This is for community groups, youth groups, schools or other community development organisations, based in Waterford City and County, who are interested in receiving funding for public education and awareness initiatives regarding litter or graffiti.

National Waste Management Plan for a Circular Economy

The Statutory Consultation Phase for the National Waste Management Plan for a Circular Economy has launched and is running from Wednesday, 3rd May until 4.00 pm on Wednesday, 5th July.

This Plan sets out a framework for the prevention and management of waste in Ireland for the period 2023 to 2029. Ireland is moving away from the traditional linear 'take-make-use-dispose' model towards a 'circular economy' regenerative growth model where resources are reused or recycled as much as possible and the generation of waste is minimised. The transition to a circular economy is essential to reduce pressure on natural resources, aid in achieving climate targets, support Sustainable Development Goals and create sustainable growth and jobs.

This Plan includes specific targets, policies and actions to enable the waste and resource sector to meet the circularity challenge and accelerate the transition to a circular economy.

Towers and Tales Festival director, Elaina Ryan of Children's Books Ireland said, "Thanks again so much for everything, I have never before worked with an organisation as spirited and generous (in all aspects) as Waterford Libraries, you are truly unique!"

•In May there were over 30 events across the county for Bealtaine, the annual celebration of creativity in older age.

•The Waterford Bealtaine Choir was announced as this year's national flagship choir, which added something special to the opening Dawn and closing Dusk chorus performances. The festival was launched by Mayor of Waterford City & County Council, Cllr John O'Leary and was attended by over 100 people.

•Authors Liz Nugent and Aingeala Flannery appeared in Carrickphierish and Central Libraries respectively, as part of the 'Writers in Waterford Libraries' series of events. These events provide an opportunity for people to connect with internationally renowned authors. Library staff have programmed these events to really focus on the love of reading and good writing that the people of Waterford have always had in abundance.

•On May 10th, the Sacred Heart Family Resource Centre hosted an art exhibition for Social Prescribing participants in Central Library. This event was supported by Creative Waterford and the Mayor of Waterford City and County Council Cllr John O'Leary and Mary Butler TD, Minister for Mental Health attended.

•There were 7,815 logins to our Times Tables Rockstars Primary school numeracy support software.

LIBRARY DEVELOPMENT:

•On the 3rd May Central Library hosted a Community Energy Hub: Home Energy Information event to provide the public with relevant and useful information and answer questions about energy at home, smart meters, renewable energy etc. This was facilitated by the Southeast Energy Agency. 14 people attended.

•3D Printing Workshops were held with St. John's Junior Cycle Students, there were 40 attendees in May. quality creative writing workshops for Waterford people in 2023.
