Thank you for your recent correspondence regarding school transport.

School transport is a significant operation managed by Bus Éireann on behalf of the Department.

The purpose of my Department's School Transport Scheme is, having regard to available resources, to support the transport to and from school of children who reside remote from their nearest school.

There are currently over 117,500 children, including over 13,000 children with special educational needs, transported in over 5,000 vehicles on a daily basis to primary and post-primary schools throughout the country covering over 100 million kilometres annually.

Children are generally eligible for school transport if they satisfy the distance criteria and are attending their nearest school.

Children who are eligible for school transport and who have completed the application process on time (applied on time and paid on time) will be accommodated on school transport services where such services are in operation for the 2019/20 school year.

A minimum number of 10 eligible children residing in a distinct locality, as determined by Bus Éireann, are required before consideration may be given to the establishment or retention of school transport services, provided this can be done within reasonable cost limits.

All school transport services are reviewed over the summer months. Arising from this review, routes may be altered, extended or withdrawn depending on the number and location of eligible children who will be availing of school transport for the following school year.

Children who are not eligible for school transport, but who completed the application process on time, will be considered for spare seats that may exist after eligible children have been facilitated; such seats are referred to as concessionary seats.

Because of the nature of concessionary transport for non-eligible children and the priority of providing places for eligible children, there may be an excess of demand over supply for concessionary places, in these cases Bus Éireann will allocate tickets for spare seats using a random selection process.

Under the terms of the scheme, the availability of concessionary transport varies from year to year based on the capacity on the buses running on all of the various routes and the number of eligible children accommodated on each route.

The terms of the School Transport Schemes are applied equitably on a national basis.

Learning Objective

Unrelenting increases in rent have made it cheaper to pay a mortgage than to rent but those entering the property market for the first time can be forgiven for being hesitant – given the scars still visible on some of the negative equity generation ahead of them.

This scheme offers mortgages at reduced rates – 2 per cent fixed for up to 25 years and 2.25 per cent for up to 30 years – to first-time buyers who have been refused a mortgage or were offered "insufficient" finance, by at least two lenders.



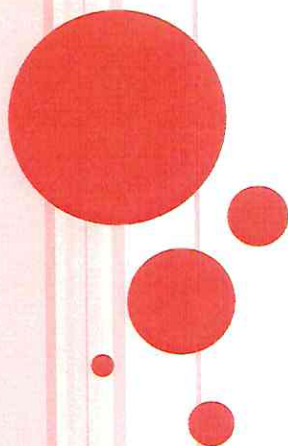

THE PROCESS TO DATE

Funding: €30,000 from Department of Justice and Equality towards the development of the Strategy.

Project Manager appointed – Community Development Office

A Research and Policy Officer engaged in Jan 2018

A series of Fingal Specific Research was undertaken. A report “Fingal County Council: Towards an Integration and Social Cohesion Strategy” which outlined the rationale, baseline statistics and structures required to support the process was produced.



THREE COMMITTEES ESTABLISHED

Internal Working Group comprises of senior staff in Fingal County Council. This group ensured the Strategy was delivered on time. It will ensure implementation of the actions

Community Integration Advisory Council (CIAC) was established with the support of the Public Participation Network and Fingal Ethnic Network. **29 members representing multiple groups.** The role of CIAC was to:

- Advise and assist in developing the Strategy.
- Consult with their own groups and encourage them to take part in consultations,
- Participate in consultations.
- Prioritise areas identified in the consultations for inclusion in the Action Plan.

Expert Advisory Group comprising of experts/high ranking officials in organisations working with migrants and service providers in Fingal who have developed similar strategies. Independent Chairperson.

This group have met at key stages during the process and will continue to meet annually to oversee the annual evaluation process and ensure the implementation of the Action Plan.

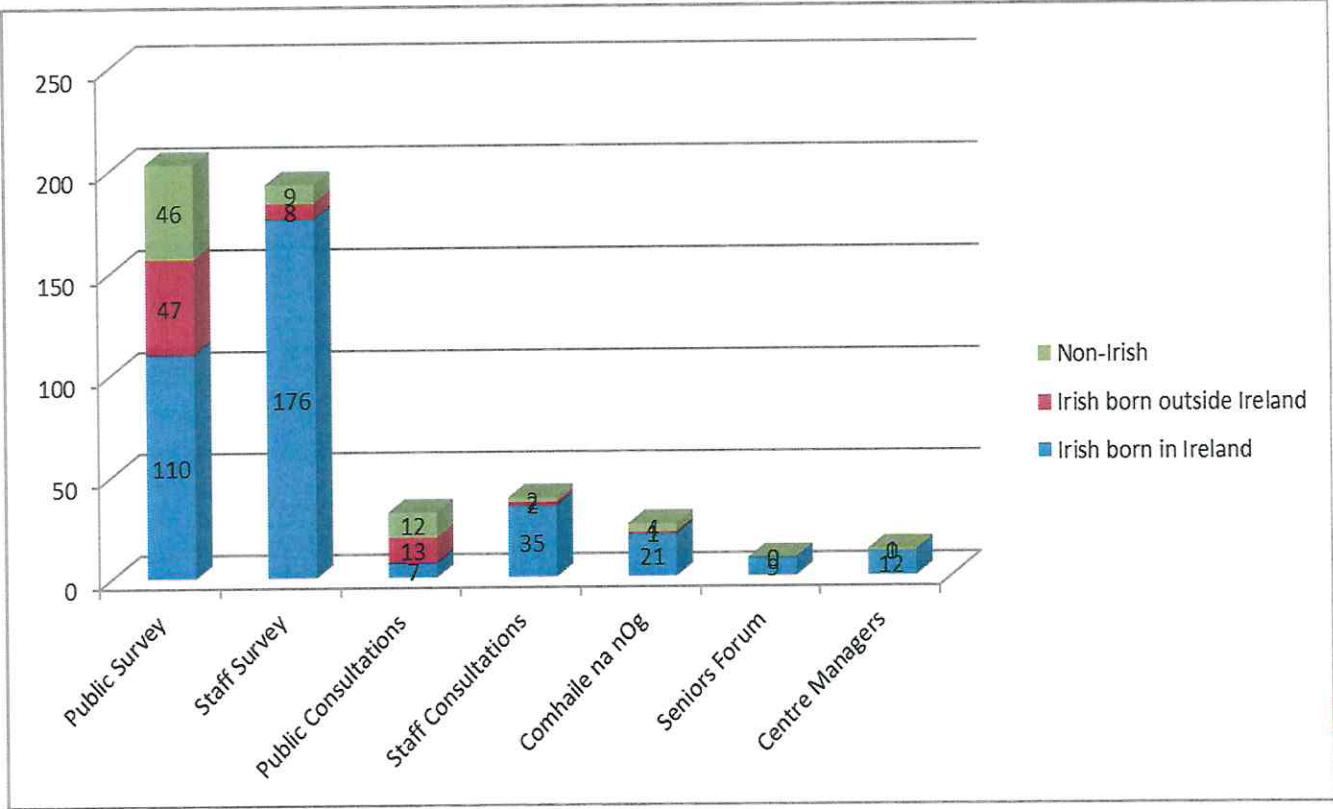

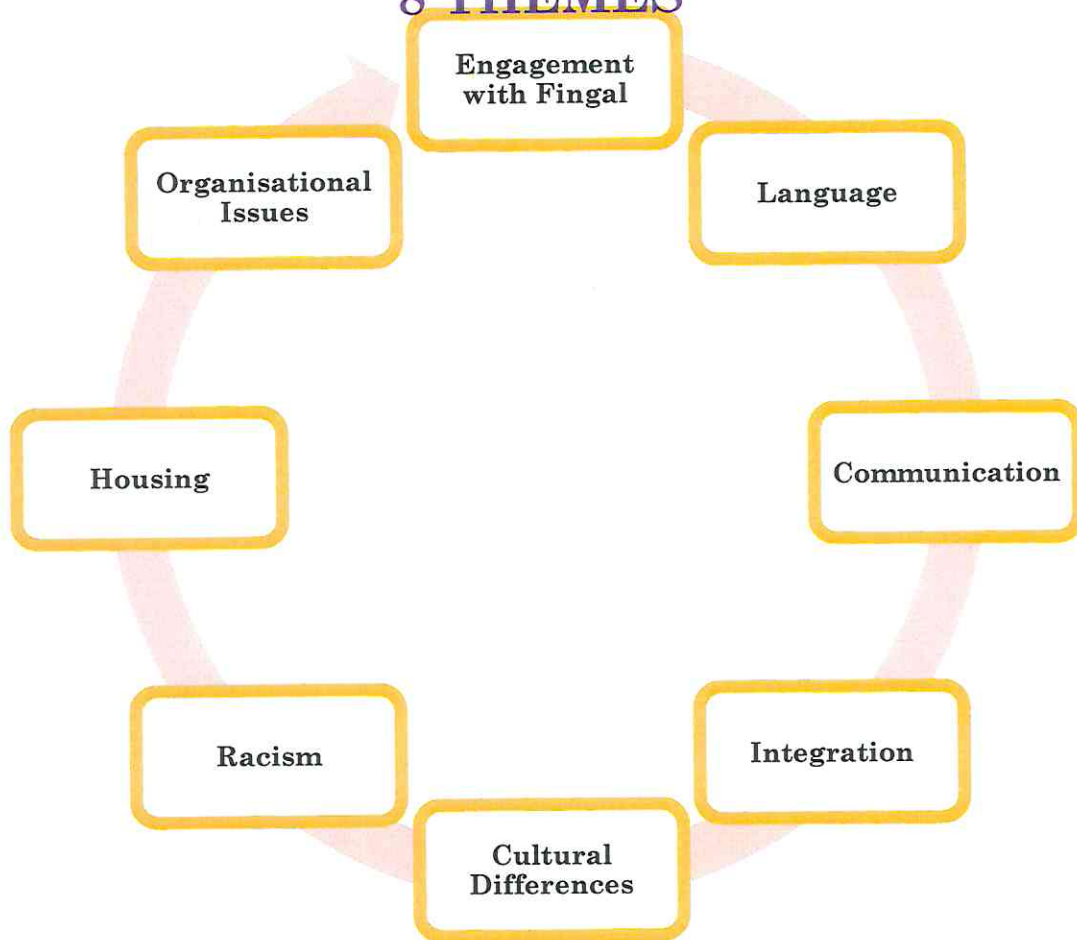
