North Quays

A. SDZ DEVELOPER:

i.WCCC is in active dialogue with potential developers, the Ireland Strategic Investment Fund (ISIF) and the Land Development Agency in respect of the North Quays SDZ site and intends to progress a proposal to conclusion in the coming months.

B. CONTRACTS:

i. Cumnor Construction Ltd and Suir Plant Ltd have being appointed for the Rock Stabilisation works to the north of Plunkett Station and the South Plaza Enabling works respectively, both contracts works are due to commence on 9th May 2022.

ii. The main construction infrastructural works is currently being tendered, this includes the development of a Sustainable Transport Bridge, Transport Hub and SDZ Access Infrastructure Works. The tender period has been extended to 27th May 2022.

iii. Tenders Assessment and Project Appraisal for the relocation of the Ferrybank Pump Station have been prepared by Nicholas O'Dwyer Consultants. These documents and updated costs report have been circulated with Irish Water and the NTA for review. We await approval to appoint the contractor as recommended in the Tender Assessment Report.

iv. Tender documents have been issued for footpath widening on Abbey Road with a return date of 20th May, it is envisaged that works will commence mid summer.

v. Tender documents for the Pump station enabling works are prepared and we are awaiting approval to issue the tender.




PLANNING APPLICATIONS RECEIVED – COUNTYWIDE

92 Planning applications were received countywide in April 2022 up to and including 27th April. This compares with 104 planning applications received in the full calendar month in 2021. In March 112 planning applications were received in the full calendar month, compared to 120 received in March 2021.

A total of 349 planning applications were received in the year to 27th April 2022. This compares to 347 planning applications which were received to the 27th of April 2021

PLANNING DECISIONS

310 applications were decided from the 1st of January to 30th April 2022 compared to 220 for the same period in 2021. Of the 310 decisions, 264 decisions were granted and 46 decisions were refused



FORWARD PLANNING UPDATE ON PREPARATION OF THE DRAFT WATERFORD CITY AND COUNTY DEVELOPMENT PLAN 2022-2028.

The Material Alterations to the Draft Waterford City and County Development Plan 2022-2028 were placed on public display for the period Thursday 3rd March to Friday 1st April 2022. Written submissions/observations were invited and the Report of the Chief Executive on the public consultation has now been issued to the Council for its consideration. The development plan is to be made on or before the 9th of June and will come into effect on the 21st of July. Workshops, as necessary, will continue with the Council in the interim to ensure adherence to the statutory timeline and the associated legislative provisions of the Planning and Development Act 2000, as amended.

Heritage Officer Report

HERITAGE

Heritage Plan Funding

The Heritage Council have awarded over €28,000 to Waterford City and County Council for a number of Heritage Plan projects including Project Management of Woodstown Viking Site Conservation Management Plan, a Wetlands Action Plan and Heritage Week events.

Community Monuments Fund

Waterford City and County Council have been awarded an allocation of over €220,000 under the 2022 Community Monuments Fund. A total of eleven applications were submitted from Waterford but the scheme is very competitive and the Council will work with the other five projects towards a resubmission in 2023. A total of 128 projects were funded nationally to a value of under €6million in what is now the third year of the Community Monuments Fund scheme

Community Heritage Grant Scheme

The Heritage Council has awarded funding to seven heritage projects across Waterford City and County to a total of €51,187 for 7 projects. The strong success rate reflects the great diversity of heritage sites and work of local heritage groups across the city and county.

Decade of Commemorations

The Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sports and Media allocated €50,000 to Waterford City & County Council for the 2022 programme of commemorations. Events being planned this year include a documentary film on the Siege of Waterford, a GIS Story Map on Civil War events in Waterford, display of the National Archives Exhibition on the Signing of the Treaty, publication by Waterford County Museum on Cumann na mBan and documentary film on Liam Lynch and the end of the Civil War.

CONSERVATION OFFICER REPORT

Heritage Council have offered Waterford City and County Council €12,000 towards an Illustrated guide to Waterford's Medieval City Walls and Towers. This funding is provided under the Irish Walled Towns Network (IWTN) - Interpretation and Events fund 2022.

The production of such a guide combines 3 of the actions proposed under the Interpretation Plan for Waterford Medieval City Walls and Towers, for which Waterford City and County Council received funding for in 2021. The proposed project will present the history but also illustrations of the walls and towers in the past and some of the activities that occurred around them. The purpose of the project is to produce a short-guided walks leaflet but this information will also be available on line.

Bóithre agus Iompar / Roads and Transportation

PROGRESS REPORT ON OUR PARTICIPATION IN THE NATIONAL PUBLIC LIGHTING ENERGY EFFICIENCY PROJECT

As Members will be aware the Council is collaborating with 21 other local authorities in the National Public Lighting Energy Efficiency Project (PLEEP) to retrofit all our public lights from the older SON / SOX type lamps to newer energy efficient LED lamps.

This change in technology will improve our energy efficiency, improve system reliability, cut our costs and reduce our carbon emissions, helping us to reach our climate targets and meet our commitments under the Local Government Climate Action Charter.

Across Waterford almost 15,000 lights will be upgraded as part of this project.


PROGRESS TO DATE

The national project is being coordinated by the Road Management Office (RMO), a shared service of the local authorities. It is being rolled out on a regional basis with a lead authority managing the roll out and in each of three regions. Waterford City & County Council is part of the Southern Region and is the first region to commence, followed by the Eastern and North-West Regions.

A works contractor, the Le Cheile Consortium, has recently been appointed as the design / build contractor by the lead local authority – Cork County Council – who are providing the project management services for Clare, Cork, Kerry, Limerick and Waterford Councils.

PROJECT TIMELINE

It is expected that detailed on site survey works by the contractor will commence in Waterford in September 2022.

ENERGY EFFICIENCY RETROFITTING 2022:

Waterford City and County Council have been allocated a quota of 76 houses for Energy Efficiency Retrofitting works for 2022 by the Department of Housing. A total of 78 houses were submitted to The Housing Department Co-ordination Office (HDCO) on 27th April 2022. Approval of the individual houses as submitted is still awaiting a response from the HDCO.

RURAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME:

ST PATRICK'S DAY/ FESTIVAL 2022:

The return of the first St. Patrick's Day Parade to Waterford since 2019 saw record crowds in attendance on March 17th. The spectacular Parade was the main event for the inaugural three-day Waterford St. Patricks Festival which was well received by the public. The theme of this year's parade was "Waterford: Ireland's Best Place to Live". Over 70 commutiy groups participated in the parade, including Spraoi, drama societies, community groups, sports clubs, youth groups and notably a Ukrainian contingent who received a warm welcome and great applause from the crowds. Waterford's St. Patricks Festival took place from Thursday March 17th to Sunday 20th and included 30 live variety acts across four outdoor stages, fairground attractions, a number of historical features and a spectacular fireworks display.

COMHAIRLE NA NÓG:

Face to face meeting are back between the young people and the coordinator and are taking place weekly to progress the 2022 action plan. Progress on 2022 activities is being made weekly by the young people and these are reviewed regularly by the steering committee members. One of the main projects for 2021/22, the Communitree app is being launchedimmenently. Phase one and phase two of the multi-annual tree planting programme has been completed at the WIT Arena and in Cherrymount This activity is in partnership with WCCC, WIT and the Lions club. Meetings are ongoing to identify additional sites with engagements taking place with the trails officer in WCCC.

WATERFORD AGE FRIENDLY PROGRAMME:

Work on the new five year Strategy has begun with a consultant appointed to assist. A steering group has been formed and progress moving ahead. Work continues through the Thematic sub-groups to progress the objectives of the AF Strategy. Preliminary enagement has begin with City Square to beging the process of it becoming an age frioenly shopping centre.

HEALTHY WATERFORD:

Current priorities include: Oversight of Healthy Ireland projects and active travel/ active communities. Extension of Healthy Ireland Round 3 funding deadline to end of March 2022. Round 4 of the Healthy Ireland Fund and programmeexpected to commence in May 2022.

SLÁINTECARE HEALTHY COMMUNITIES PROGRAMME (SHCP):

The Council through the LCDC has been tasked with the oversight and implementation at local level of elements of the Sláintecare Healthy Communities Programme. These include the employment of a SHCP Local Development Officer; the setting up of a SHCP Local Implementation Team (LIT) which has commenced and the Enhancement Funding Scheme. An application for €250k funding was successful and projects will be commencing shortly.

LOCAL COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP:

The tender for a Community Safety Plan has been re-issued on e-tender with a closing date of 12th May 2022. Offices have been secured for the LCSP in 8A Catherine Street and we are working with WIT to secure a post-graduate student who we hope to be in position by the end of May. A draft consultation plan has been prepared and consultation with communities will commence in May with the support of the 30 person Community Safety Partnership.

COVID 19 COMMUNITY RESPONSE FORUM:

The CRF – various agencies and organisations working together to address Covid-related issues - continues to meet on a monthly basis.

PRIDE OF PLACE:

The 2021 National Awards, are taking place in Killarney, Co. Kerry on May 16th 2022 with three groups up for awards. Waterford's main entry for the 2022competition will be the Surprise Surprise Group having won the 2021 PPN awards with an additional entry coming from the Housing Department.

Social Inclusion:

MIGRANT INTEGRATION:

Various initiatives being followed up on to progress the Strategy adopted by Council in 2020.

SICAP:

Work in ongoing with Waterford Area Partnership continuing to implement the SICAP programme on behalf of the LCDC with 79 local community groups and 953 individuals in Waterford expected to benefit in 2022.

SICAP Budget allocations for 2022 have now been confirmed and the budget for Waterford City & County (24-1) is €1,280,970. This is an 11% increase on 2021.

The Annual Plan for 2022 and the Annual Performance Review for 2021 have been approved by Waterford LCDC.

TIG:

The Waterford Traveller Interagency Group continues to meet regularly by way of Zoom.

ANTI- DUMPING INITIATIVE 2022:

21 projects in the functional area of Waterford City & County Council have been approved for funding to the value of €103,900 under the Department of Environment, Climate and Communications sponsored Anti-Dumping Initiative 2022.

IRISH BUSINESSES AGAINST LITTER - IBAL 2022:

Irish Businesses Against Litter have advised Waterford City & County Council that the IBAL Litter League 2022 will commence shortly. Both Waterford City & Waterford City – Ballybeg have been selected for survey this year as part of the IBAL Litter League. There will be a strong emphasis on cigarette butts and smoking related litter along with Covid related litter e.g. face masks, gloves. As with 2020 & 2021 there will be a particular emphasis on outdoor sites e.g. public parks / riverwalks / promenades etc.

Environmental Education & Awareness

TIDY TOWNS:

A series of short online talks for Tidy Towns groups has been taking place during March and April, on the topics of litter management, sustainability, special awards categories and planting for pollinators. Speakers included winning Tidy Towns groups from Clare, the Biodiversity Data Centre about the Pollinator Plan and the Tidy Towns Unit itself. All local Tidy Towns groups were contacted with details of these events and invited to attend.

WASTE PREVENTION:

We are working to encourage the use of reusable cups at cafes in conjunction with 2GoCup. With 22,000 single use cups used every hour in Ireland, we are seeking to get cafes involved in a reuse campaign. The timing is good for a campaign of this nature, with the lifting of Covid restrictions and the recent announcement of the levy on single use cups. Waterford City & County Council will work with 2GoCups to engage 10 cafes in this campaign; 5 cafes along the Greenway and 5 in Waterford. Having identified local cafes for participation in this campaign, we will then organise an informal meeting of all 10 cafes, 2GoCup and WCCC to discuss details of how the scheme will work and have a questions and answers session. It is hoped that these 10 cafes will then become case studies to encourage other cafes to accept and move towards reusable cups.

GREEN FLAG PROGRAMME:

School visits and assessments have taken place for green flag renewals and first time applications. There are 51 schools due to renew their Green Flag this year. Green School visits can take place either in person or virtually, however most schools have chosen to have an in-person visit.

BIODIVERSITY:

The interactive Growing Together Course ran during March and April. Participants learnt to grow their own vegetables and pollinator plants. It was of special interest to Tidy Towns groups and Green School coordinators.

COMMUNITY CLEAN-UPS:

Waterford City & County Council facilitates community clean ups throughout the year to clean up litter and illegally dumped waste from approach roads, local beauty spots, beaches and general public areas. National Spring Clean took place throughout the month of April, In supporting this event Waterford City & County Council supplied bags, gloves and litter pickers to many of the groups taking part, as well as collecting the bags of litter afterwards.

LOCAL GRANTS:

Applications for two grants closed on 1st April and are now being assessed: The Local Anti-Graffiti and Anti -Litter Awareness Grant 2022 assists local communities to tackle litter and graffiti . The Local Waste Prevention Grant 2022 is designed for community groups who want to help to take steps on waste prevention, re-use and repair activities in their local area.

Ealaíona & Cultúr / Arts & Culture Arts Report

•Poetry Day Ireland on April 28th had a full programme in place in person and online for the city and county.

•ArtLinks Bursaries for individuals have been awarded. Collaboration award adjudication is pending.

•Creative Movement programme with Waterford Mental Health services has entered it's second stage. Plans being considered for a Photographic programme for the autumn.

•Entries have just opened for the Arts Office, national Molly Keane Creative Writing Award 2022.

•The national Bealtaine Festival - Celebrating Creativity in Older Age will take place during the month of May with the Arts and Library Service providing several events.

EVENT HIGHLIGHTS FROM APRIL:

•A total of 31 Spring into Storytime events took place across the County as part of the national Right to Read programme with 737 attendees.

•1,505 'Little Library Bags' are being distributed via Libraries to all children beginning primary school in County Waterford in 2022.

•The Waterford VTOS, WWETB, Art, Craft and Design Graduate End of Year Exhibition was launched in the Index Gallery in Central Library on April 5th by the Mayor of Waterford City and County Council Cllr. Joe Kelly.

•Towers & Tales Festival schools programme took place on April 29th with 8 schools visited by popular Children's Authors and Illustrators. Library staff worked across the festival facilitating a book swap and accompanying authors to events. Author and student interviews featured on RTE news2day.

•There were 16 baby & toddler group meetings in April in Library branches across the county with a total of 300 big and little people attending.

•This month saw the return of The Grow it Forward campaign, run in conjunction with Healthy Ireland and Grow it Yourself, this year's focus is on community gardens. Seed packs and resources are available from Library branches.

•Poetry Day on April 28th Featured pocket poems from Poetry Ireland in branches.

UPCOMING EVENTS IN MAY:

•Bealtaine events are scheduled in all branches during May.

•A Beginner's Guide to getting digitally connected and the Get Connected: Wifi Hotspots and Services guides are now available on the Library website, a collaboration between Waterford Libraries, WWETB, the Older Persons Council and the subgroup of digital connectivity.

LIBRARY DEVELOPMENT:

•Waterford Library staff are actively working on developments to support Ukrainians seeking safety in Waterford. Membership forms and Information on our services have been translated into Ukrainian.
