## Forbairt Eacnamaíoch / Economic Development

### North Quays

#### A. SDZ DEVELOPER

i.WCCC is in active dialogue with potential developers, the Ireland Strategic Investment Fund (ISIF) and the Land Development Agency in respect of the North Quays SDZ site and intends to progress a proposal to conclusion in the coming months.

#### B. CONTRACTS

i. A contractor is being appointed for the Rock Stabilisation works to the north of Plunkett Station, works are due to commence towards the end of April 2022.

ii. A contractor has been appointed for the South Plaza Enabling Works and works are due to commence mid April.

iii. The main construction tender for the infrastructural works is currently being tendered, this includes the development of a Sustainable Transport Bridge, Transport Hub and SDZ Access Infrastructure Works. The tender period has been extended to 9th May 2022.

iv. Tenders for the relocation of the Ferrybank Pump Station have been assessed by Nicholas O'Dwyer Consultants and recommendations for appointment are currently being made.

v. Tender documents will be issued shortly for two enabling works contracts - footpath widening on Abbey Road and Pump station enabling works.




#### PLANNING APPLICATIONS RECEIVED – COUNTYWIDE

95 Planning applications were received countywide in March 2022 up to and including 28th March. This compares with 120 planning applications received in the full calendar month in 2021.

A total of 240 planning applications were received in the year to 28th March 2022. This compares to 254 planning applications which were received to the 28th of March 2021.

#### **PLANNING DECISIONS**

242 applications were decided from the 1st of January to 31st March 2022 compared to 220 for the same period in 2021. Of the 242, 209 decisions were granted and 33 decisions were refused.



#### FORWARD PLANNING UPDATE ON PREPARATION OF THE DRAFT WATERFORD CITY AND COUNTY DEVELOPMENT PLAN 2022-2028.

The Material Alterations to the Draft Waterford City and County Development Plan 2022-2028 were placed on public display for the period Thursday 3rd March to Friday 1st April 2022. Written submissions/observations were invited and at time of writing a total of circa 450 written submissions had been received. A Chief Executive Report will be prepared and submitted to the Plenary Council by the 28th April giving further details of the submissions and the response and recommendation of the CE with regard to same. Further workshops will be arranged to consider the CE Report thereafter with the making of the Development Plan on or before the 9th of June. The new Plan will come into effect 6 weeks after the date on which it is made.

#### PRE-PLANNING MEETINGS.

The following times have been allocated for pre-planning meetings in order to improve the preplanning service: Dungarvan / Lismore & Comeragh Planning districts - every Wednesday morning from 9:30am to 12:30pm in 30-minute slots.

Metropolitan Planning district – every Thursday afternoon from 2pm to 4:30pm in 30-minute slots. Meetings will be held mainly by remote means using MS teams. Preplanning meetings for larger scale proposals will be arranged outside these times where deemed appropriate. 6

### Heritage Officer Report

#### HERITAGE

#### Waterford Commemorations Programme

The launch of The Bad Times, a publication by William Fraher, Waterford County Museum took place in Woodhouse, Stradbally also on March 5th. Other events being planned this year include a documentary film on the Siege of Waterford, a GIS Story Map on Civil War events in Waterford, display of the National Archives Exhibition on the Signing of the Treaty, publication by Waterford County Museum on Cumann na mBan and documentary film on Liam Lynch and the end of the Civil War.

#### **Community Monuments Fund**

Twelve applications were submitted to the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage under the 2022 Community Monuments Fund and the outcome will be known by late April.

#### CONSERVATION

#### Historic Structure Fund (HSF)

Waterford applied for 5 projects under the Historic Structure Fund (HSF) and they all got the full funding requested which is €339,755. Details to be provided in the relevant district reports.

This means that in total Waterford City and County Council has received €522,155 for built heritage for 2022 from the Dept.

## Seirbhísí Pobail / Community Services

#### RURAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME:

•The payments on all LEADER Projects are progressing well.

•Between now and the end of the year over €2m will be paid out to applicants.

•The Departmental Auditor carried out a random audit project inspection. This went well.

•The March application was approved for €150,000.

•Training session was provided in early March for all the potential applicants under the February Call.

#### ST PATRICK'S DAY/ FESTIVAL 2022

The return of the first St. Patrick's Day Parade to Waterford since 2019 saw record crowds in attendance on March 17th. The spectacular Parade was the main event for the inaugural three-day Waterford St. Patricks Festival which was well received by the public. The theme of this year's parade was "Waterford: Ireland's Best Place to Live". Over 70 commuity groups participated in the parade, including Spraoi, drama societies, community groups, sports clubs, youth groups and notably a Ukrainian contingent who received a warm welcome and great applause from the crowds. Waterford's St. Patricks Festival took place from Thursday March 17th to Sunday 20th and included 30 live variety acts across four outdoor stages, fairground attractions, a number of historical features and a spectacular fireworks display.

#### COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES FUND 2021:

All 146 applicants have returned their signed the terms and acceptance form and the grant payments has been processed for all groups.

#### THE SUPPORTING WATERFORD COMMUNITY FUND 2022:

350 applications were received, which is a slight increase from last year. The recommended allocations report has been circulated to the elected members prior to this meeting for their approval..

#### **COMHAIRLE NA NÓG:**

Progress on 2022 activities is being made weekly by the young people and these are reviewed regularly by the steering committee members. One of the main projects for 2021/22, the Communitree app is being launched immenently. Phase one and phase two of the multi-annual tree planting programme has been completed at the WIT Arena and in Cherry-mount This activity is in partnership with WCCC, WIT and the Lions club. Meetings are ongoing to identify additional sites with engagements taking place with the trails officer in WCCC. A new coordinator (Amy Doherty) is now in place and assisting the young people to deliver on their action plan.

#### WATERFORD AGE FRIENDLY PROGRAMME:

Work continues through the Thematic sub-groups to progress the objectives of the AF Strategy. Round 1 of the AF Business Recognition Programme for Waterford City and County is complete with 11 AF Charters having being issued during March. Work on the new five year Strategy has begun with a steering group having been formed to review progress.

#### HEALTHY WATERFORD:

Current priorities include: Oversight of Healthy Ireland projects and active travel/ active communities.Extension of Healthy Ireland Round 3 funding deadline to end of March 2022.Round 4 of the Healthy Ireland Fund and programmeexpected to commence in May 2022.

#### SLÁINTECARE HEALTHY COMMUNITIES PROGRAMME (SHCP):

The Council through the LCDC has been tasked with the oversight and implementation at local level of elements of the Sláintecare Healthy Communities Programme. These include the employment of a SHCP Local Development Officer; the setting up of a SHCP Local Implementation Team (LIT) which has commenced and the Enhancement Funding Scheme. An application for €250k funding was successful and projects will be commencing shortly.

#### LOCAL COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP:

A public consultation on Community Safety was held on Wednesday 9th March 2022, the results of this consultation will form the basis of the Community Safety Plan. Following a meeting with the Department of Justice we have secured additional funding to allow us to retender for a consultant for the development of the CSP. Offices have been secured for the LCSP in 8A Catherine Street and we hope to move there in the coming weeks. Paula Hilman, Assistant Commissioner, Roads Policing & Community Engagement, has also agreed to come and meet the partnership later this year.

#### COVID 19 COMMUNITY RESPONSE FORUM:

The CRF – various agencies and organisations working together to address Covid-related issues - continues to meet on a monthly basis.

#### PRIDE OF PLACE:

The 2021 National Awards, will now take place in Killarney, Co. Kerry on May 16th 2022. Waterford's main entry for the 2022 competition will be the Surprise Surprise Group having won the 2021 PPN awards.

#### **MIGRANT INTEGRATION:**

Various initiatives being followed up on to progress the Strategy adopted by Council in 2020.

#### SICAP:

Work in ongoing with Waterford Area Partnership continuing to implement the SICAP programme on behalf of the LCDC with 79 local community groups and 953 individuals in Waterford expected to benefit in 2022.

SICAP Budget allocations for 2022 have now been confirmed and the budget for Waterford City & County (24-1) is €1,280,970. This is an 11% increase on 2021.

The Annual Plan for 2022 and the Annual Performance Review for 2021 have been approved by Waterford LCDC.

#### TIG:

The Waterford Traveller Interagency Group continues to meet regularly by way of Zoom.

#### **CIVIL DEFENCE:**


Early in the month Civil Defence teams held an exercise in preparation for the Radiation Monitoring Service in support of the Environmental Protection Agency. The exercise was to practice our techniques and procedures on gathering Low level Background Radiation data in the form of Grass and Soil Samples to be used as a comparison Data Set to what the EPA record themselves.

This month also saw the safe return to in person training, where we are working on our core skills to retrain our volunteers in their different service area's like First Aid, Communications etc.

St Patrick's Day Parade was also a big day for Civil Defence volunteers who took part in the parade.

Civil Defence have been making preparations to assist the welcome of Ukrainian Refugees to Waterford. Emergency capabilities have been reviewed and a delegation travelled to Dublin to assist in the set up and management of reception centres for Ukrainian Displaced Persons. We continue to provide technical assistance and logistical support for the provision of rest centres.

Whilst the easing of Covid 19 restrictions has been positive we are monitoring and reviewing the situation in general but looking forward to working with our volunteers to identify what training is required to get back to a new normal.

### **Environmental Education & Awareness**

#### **COMMUNITY CLEAN-UPS**

Waterford City & County Council facilitates community clean-ups throughout the year to clean up litter and illegally dumped waste from approach roads, local beauty spots, beaches and general public areas. National Spring Clean takes place throughout the month of April; registrations have commenced at www.nationalspringclean.org; as part of this we supply bags, gloves and litter pickers to many of the groups taking part, as well as collecting the bags of litter afterwards.

#### **GREEN FLAG PROGRAMME**

School visits and assessments are well underway for green flag renewals and first time applicants. Fifty one schools are due to renew their Green Flag this year. The deadline for renewal applications is on Friday, April 1st 2022 for the 2021/2022 academic year. Green School visits can take place either in person or virtually, however most schools have chosen to have an in-person visit.

#### BIODIVERSITY

The interactive "Growing Together" course ran during March and continues into April. Participants learn to grow their own vegetables and pollinator plants. It has proven to be of special interest to Tidy Towns groups and Green School coordinators. A once off "Wildflower Masterclass" took place in March and provided advice on how best to re-wild/plant a wildflower area to help pollinators and biodiversity.

National Tree Week took place 20 – 26th March. Waterford City & County Council distributed 300 free native saplings to schools across Co. Waterford. A tree planting event also took place on Friday 25th March to mark National Tree Week.

#### **TIDY TOWNS**

A series of short online talks for Tidy Towns groups will continue during April, on the topics of litter management, sustainability, special awards categories and planting for pollinators. Speakers taking part include a winning Tidy Towns groups from Clare, the Biodiversity Data Centre about the Pollinator Plan and the Tidy Towns Unit of the Department of Rural & Community Development. All local Tidy Towns groups were contacted with details of these events and invited to attend.

#### **CLIMATE CHANGE**

In conjunction with the Europe Direct Centre at Central Library a number of online lunchtime events were held during March, entitled 'Climate Action – what changes can I make?'. The events explored what action we can all take to contribute to the Waterford and National Climate Action Plans to create a better local and national environment for the present and the future. Events included talks on furniture upcycling demonstration using locally recycled paint from Renew Enterprises, a talk about wildflowers, how to grow your own vegetables active travel and how climate change is affecting our coastal heritage locally.

Waterford City & County Council has been working with the Waterford Teachers Centre to pilot a Climate Literacy programme with secondary schools this Spring. This involves a ten week Climate Literacy programme, focused on improving climate literacy and fostering behavior change in schools. The course is developed to include teacher training, resources, and lesson plans. The teacher training is designed to equip teachers with the knowledge, attitudes, behaviors, and skills required to effectively and confidently deliver not only this course, but also across their curriculum subject as the course can complement any subject framework that has an environmental strand. There will be training sessions weekly online to support teachers to deliver the content of the class. Following training teachers will be able to deliver the course by themselves to groups of students.

### Ealaíona & Cultúr / Arts & Culture Arts Report

The inaugural 'Foolhardy Festival of Comedy and Commedia' was held in the Waterford Cultural Quarter from April 1 - 3. In all there were 23 events featuring over 100 slots. The festival gave short-term employment to 50 people (performers, programmers, producers, technicians, videographers) under the guise of the Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Sports and Media's LLPPS3 scheme. Local hospitality businesses reported a healthy increase in sales. Foolhardy was a diversity friendly festival that mainly covered 'Stand-up' routines but also had a strong academic and professional development programme. It was produced by the Waterford Arts Service.

•The Waterford Film Centre has been commissioned to do a documentary on the Foolhardy Festival, again under the LLPPS3 scheme.

•The Arts Service was involved with the St. Patrick's Festival. Conor Nolan was one of the judges at the parade. The Service also provided for the Jazz event at the Bishop's Palace on the Sunday. The concert was paid for by the Dept. of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Sports and Media's LLPPS3 scheme.

Poetry Day is just around the corner with a strong programme of City and County events.

•The Waterford Gallery of Art and the Waterford Art Collection is continuing its outreach programme which is aimed at community focused groups. In Early March a talk and workshop was delivered to Ferrybank Scouts and the Gallery hosted a visit by a retirees group. A programme is being developed for Primary Schools. The current exhibition (Aspects) is due to close in May.

•GOMA Gallery has a wonderful exhibition by Japanese artist Seiko Hayase – 'World in Between'. It is part of the Gallery's 'Connect 5 Award' partnered with BKB Studios, Engage Artists Studios, Sample Studios and Wickham Studios.

•The Arts Service was delighted to have been part of the entourage that met the British Royal Couple Charles and Camilla on their visit to Waterford. A copy of Dr Peter Jordan's book on the Waterford Collection was presented to Prince Charles to commemorate the event. Prince Charles was introduced to a selection of Artists and arts organisers. The British Royal couple also met with and talked to the Music Generation Waterford Harp Quintet.

•Planning for the Summer In The City is well underway. Activities are being looked at with placements in the Cultural Quarter, the Retail Quarter, the Hospitality Quarter and the Viking Triangle. It's a co-production between Anna Jordan and the Arts Service.

•Poetry Day is on April 28th this year. A full programme is planned with poets for events in the City and County and a possible tie-in with the Waxed Lemon and the Waterford Gallery of Art.

•Artifice, a visual arts education programme for TY students from the City and County in association with Lismore Castle Arts went on show in their venue during the month and can now be viewed online at their website.

•The Arts Office was represented at the national Arts Council/Local Government joint conference 'Places Matters' in Carlow.

•The 'Landscapes' exhibition continues at the Old Market House Arts Centre, Dungarvan plus 'Market 22' showcasing works from artists from the region.

We are greatly enjoying meeting and greeting people as they come back physically to our Libraries and we look forward to meeting even more during March as we open up to events, meetings and in-house activities with more access to study and reading spaces.

Waterford's 3rd Global Women's Conference, 'Break the Bias' took place in the Theatre Royal on International Women's Day, March 8th with 130 attendees, the event was formally opened by Deputising Mayor of Waterford City & County Cllr. Mary Roche.

The CHERISH Project: Climate Change and Coastal Heritage exhibition highlighting the impact of climate change was launched by Mayor of Waterford City & County Joe Kelly on the 14th.

The book, 'The People We Grow Up To Be,' was launched by Deputy Mayor of Waterford City & County Council Seanie Power in the Index Gallery, Central Library. This work celebrates the Intergenerational Choir.

As part of Climate action week a series of lunchtime webinars took place on topics such as: pollinators, horticulture, growing your own food with Mick Kelly from GIY, active travel and up-cycling with 223 total attendees.
