



General Environment Enforcement

Environmental Inspectors continue to investigate and monitor illegal waste issues, littering, fly-tipping and illegal signage and issued litter fines where offences are detected. Members of the public are encouraged to contact the local authority to report all incidents of illegal dumping or littering by using the following telephone number: 0818 10 20 20.

The following graph shows a comparison of the top categories of CRM cases recorded in the Dungarvan/Lismore area during the period to the end of May in the years 2022 & 2023.



Presentation & Cleansing

Dungarvan:

- Fairlane Park Pump Track works ongoing. Works programmed commenced on 2nd May with planned completion date of mid-July.
- Ongoing The 'Let Dandelions Bee' initiative where areas of interest are allowed to flourish and let dandelions bloom for a short few weeks is ongoing.
- Preparation and changeover of the inserts of the planters throughout Grattan Square and the central part of
 the town is ongoing. Additional planter boxes have been ordered for Grattan Square. These winter flowering
 inserts shall be returned to the presentation depot and replaced with the summer planting schemes which
 have been retained successfully over the winter months.
- Topographic Survey works ongoing of Town Park, Walton Park & Sports Centre.
- Stump Grinding contractor started May 2023 across the county with a 6 week programme including areas in Dungarvan that require stump grinding from the winter 22/23 tree works programme. Waterford City & Tramore are now complete, Dungarvan to start in first week of June.

Amnesty Day for hazardous household waste at Dungarvan Civic Amenity Site

An Amnesty Day will be held for hazardous household waste in Dungarvan Civic Amenity Site on Thursday, 15th June between 9.00am – 1.00pm and 1.30pm – 4.00pm. Household detergents, aerosols, pesticides, herbicides, varnishes, oils, paints, and medicinal waste will be accepted from householders. Non-toxic water-based paints, sharps/needles, agricultural waste such as dosing containers, etc. will not be accepted.

Climate Action

Climate Action Plan

The pre-draft consultation on the Climate Action Plan is live and submissions can be made until 5.00pm on 16th June. The Consultation lays out the challenges that are ahead for Waterford, what the Council's responsibility is and what other places have done. Bearing these in mind, we are asking the public what climate actions they think the Council should take and what they would like to be able to do themselves. The Consultation has been shared with the PPN, Schools, the Chambers and it has been publicised on the Council's media platforms. We will continue to promote it across the next 3 weeks and we are hosting information sessions in the libraries. We look forward to hearing from many Waterford people as possible on this important topic.

The actions decided upon and approved by the Councillors in January 2024 will be the actions that Waterford City & County Council will take between now and the end of the decade to reduce emissions in the City and County and to prepare for Climate Change.

A workshop on the Consultation was delivered to elected members on 1st June last.

Community Climate Action Fund

We await the opening of the Community Climate Action Fund. Details are being worked out on issues such as bridge funding for communities. Environmental Education & Awareness

Waste Prevention

National Food Waste Recycling Week takes place from $5^{th} - 11^{th}$ June with the intention of promoting food waste recycling as a positive climate action but also reminding people to do it correctly. Recent research shows a 2% increase in plastic found in food waste collections, a trend that needs to be kept in check and reversed. As part of this, ads are running on local radio and a social media campaign is being run to promote food recycling and an event to distribute food waste caddies and information packs free of charge at Dungarvan Civic Amenity Site will take place on 10^{th} June next to promote correct food waste separation.

Drinking water stations at beaches at Ardmore and Clonea are now in place. These will enable visitors to the beach to refill their water bottles, thus encouraging reuse and refilling. This will also reduce the number of plastic bottles disposed of.

Litter

Ballot bins were recently installed in Waterford City, Tramore and Dungarvan and are an initiative to encourage smokers to properly dispose of their cigarette butts. The ballot bins feature an engaging voting system that is a fun way to get people to vote by placing their cigarette butts in one of two voting slots. The ballot bins feature customisable questions and smokers can vote on the topic. The polls will be regularly updated and will feature Yes / No polls with questions such as 'Were Ross and Rachel on a break?' or 'Pineapple on Pizza?' Other polls will offer a choice of answers such as 'Best Blaa filling? and 'Which came first? The Chicken or the egg'. While the topics may be fun and engaging, cigarette butts pose a real societal and environmental problem. They are the most common form of litter in both Waterford and indeed the world, with an estimated 4.5 trillion cigarette butts thrown away every year.

Community Clean-Ups

Waterford City & County Council facilitates community clean ups throughout the year to clean up litter and illegally dumped waste from approach roads, local beauty spots, beaches and general public areas. These have begun again in earnest. We continue to supply bags, gloves and litter pickers to many of the groups taking part, distributing them from both our Dungarvan and Waterford offices. Collection of any bags of litter is then arranged following the clean-up.

Grants

A local Anti-Litter and Anti-Graffiti Grant and a local Circular Economy Grant were advertised on the Council's website, social media and in local newspapers. Applications have been assessed and funding offers made.

Local Anti-Litter and Anti-Graffiti Grant: This is for community groups, youth groups, schools or other community development organisations, based in Waterford City and County, who are interested in receiving funding for public education and awareness initiatives regarding litter or graffiti.

Local Circular Economy Grant: A circular economy is based on long-life products that can be renewed, reused, repaired, upgraded and refurbished to preserve natural resources, protect habitats and reduce pollution. It is about finding ways to keep items in use longer and not generating as much waste in the first place. It is about rethinking the way we do things – redesigning the items we use – changing attitudes and changing behaviours about what we buy and what we throw away. The main focus for applications this year should be on projects to promote a circular economy e.g. repairing, reusing, building skills and knowledge in the community to facilitate repair and reuse, changing attitudes and behaviours to how we use items, reduce use of single use items (encourage use of reusable items).

National Waste Management Plan for a Circular Economy

The Statutory Consultation Phase for the National Waste Management Plan for a Circular Economy has launched and is running from Wednesday, 3rd May until 4.00 pm on Wednesday, 5th July.

This Plan sets out a framework for the prevention and management of waste in Ireland for the period 2023 to 2029.

Ireland is moving away from the traditional linear 'take-make-use-dispose' model towards a 'circular economy' regenerative growth model where resources are reused or recycled as much as possible and the generation of waste is minimised. The transition to a circular economy is essential to reduce pressure on natural resources, aid in achieving climate targets, support Sustainable Development Goals and create sustainable growth and jobs.

This Plan includes specific targets, policies and actions to enable the waste and resource sector to meet the circularity challenge and accelerate the transition to a circular economy.
